CEN was founded in 1999 by four people. The late, great Gerry German (who sadly passed away after a CEN event in May 2012), myself, John O'Malley and Alderman Obajimmi Adefiranye.


Gerry with whom I had worked closely on exclusions in my role as director of education and leisure services in the London Borough of Hackney (1989-1997) and he, as Principal Education Officer with the Commission for Racial Equality (CRE.). Our collaboration continued when, on retiring from the CRE, Gerry established the Working Group Against Racism in Children's Resources.

Gerry and I were alarmed at the disproportionate number of black and mixed heritage children who were being excluded from school annually, especially black boys. The Department for Education publishes the statistics year on year but appeared to be concerned only with associating black students with indiscipline, disruptive behaviour, and commensurately with low achievement.

The third founder was the late John O'Malley, a veteran community activist and case worker assisting parents with appeals against exclusions, and with special education needs cases. We had collaborated about three decades earlier in establishing the first law centre in the country, in Notting Hill.

John (who passed away in 2020) was a member of CENs board and supported the work of our education advocates over at least two decades, being our 'go to' person for guidance on dealing with schools' exclusion of children with special educational needs and disabilities, including many with neurodiverse conditions.
